# Manitowoc Police Department Monthly Report November 2008



The Manitowoc Police Department's Monthly Reports are an estimation of activity received from the Joint Dispatch Center. True and accurate reports and statistics can be obtained on the annual report, as further investigation into these complaints may reveal a different type of call and/or situation than what was originally reported.

For the month, the Manitowoc Police Department received **2,134 CALLS FOR SERVICE**, which resulted in **1,329 INCIDENTS/COMPLAINTS** being investigated by the department. The Manitowoc Police Department takes pride in our high standards of providing public safety to our community, and within this report are some examples where this is making a difference.

Each jurisdiction submits monthly reports to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program, which collects and reports crime offense data for the Nation as Part I and Part II crimes. This is essential to maintain the uniformity and consistency of data nation wide.

The Manitowoc Police Department recorded 67 Part I Crimes (see below for details) for this month. The Part II offenses encompass all other crime classifications outside those defined as Part I.

It should be noted, that this does not reflect all Part I Crimes for the month due to continuing investigations.

- **Murder/Non-Negligent** – the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.
- **Forcible Rape** – the carnal knowledge of a female forcibly and against her will.
- **Robbery** – the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
- **Assault(s)** – an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.
- **Burglary** – the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft.
- **Larceny/Theft** – the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Motor Vehicle Theft is not included. All theft and attempted thefts are counted.
- **Motor Vehicle Thefts** – the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is classified as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on land surface and not on rails.
- **Arson** – any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

# Manitowoc Police Department State Arrests - Juvenile/Adult November 2008

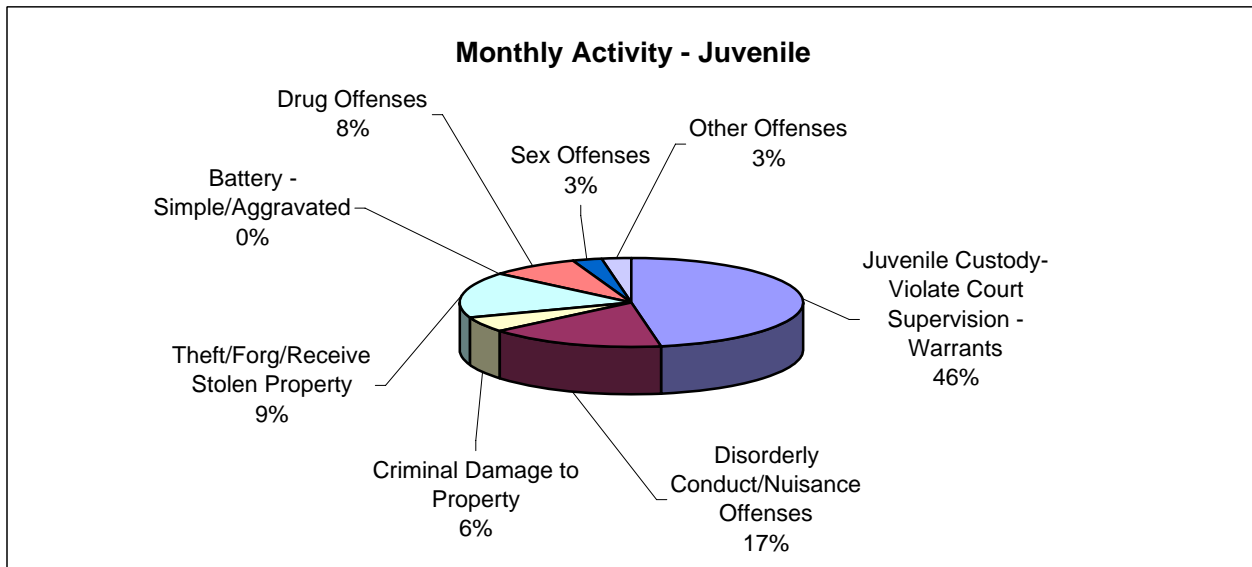

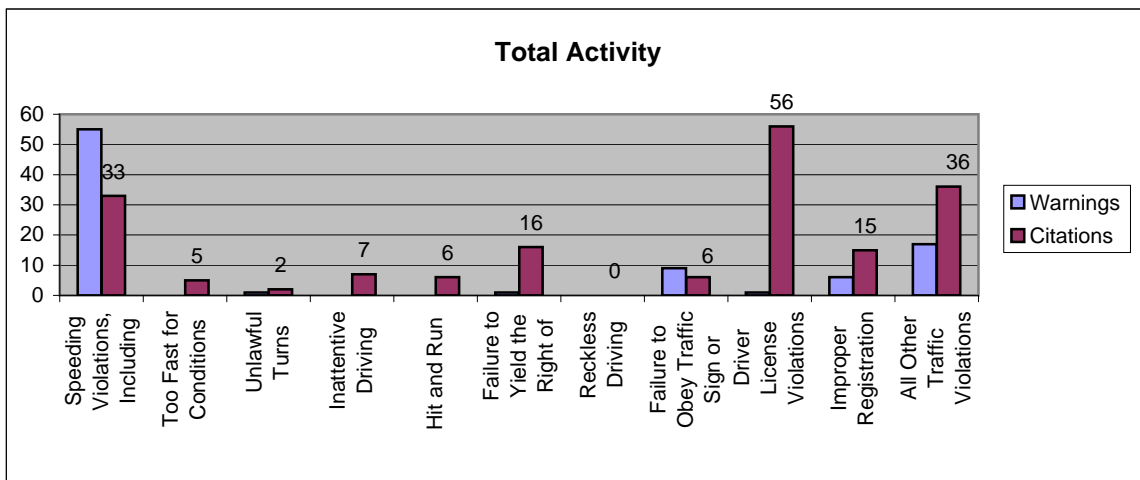

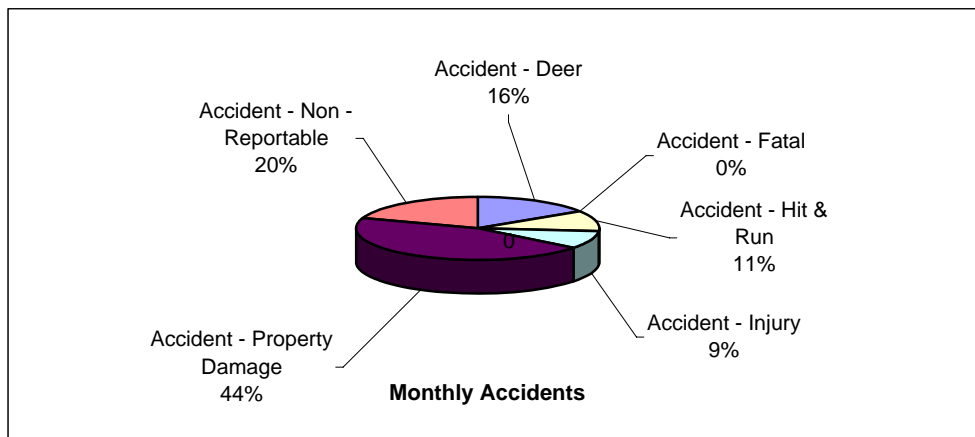
# Manitowoc Police Department Accident Statistics November 2008

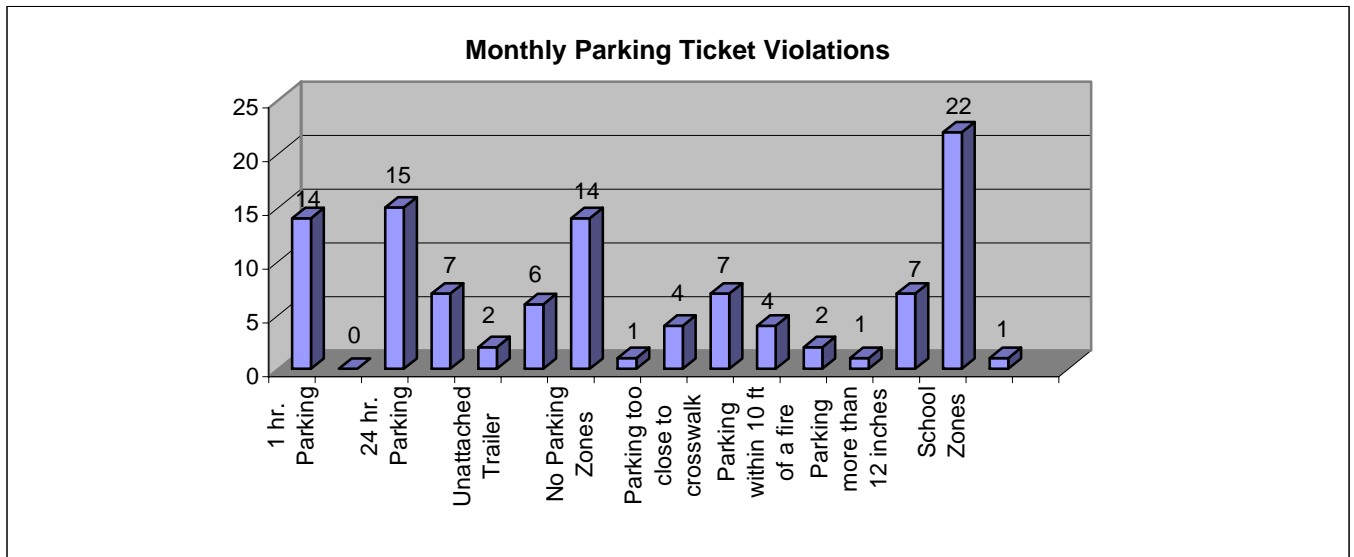

Patrol/Investigations

The Patrol Division consists of officers that patrol our neighborhoods, check our businesses during and after business hours and respond to alarms, rescue calls and other calls for service. Officers are trained and certified in a number of disciplines, including traffic law enforcement, OWI detection and enforcement, and interviews and interrogations. Some officers are certified accident investigators and evidence technicians, while some have attended gang recognition schools and drug recognition classes.

Investigators are primarily responsible for the investigation of major crimes such as homicide, sexual assault, burglary, robbery, forgery and fraud. Those assigned to these crimes have developed an advanced level of expertise by attending specialized training and through years of experience working on complex cases with colleagues at the state and local levels.

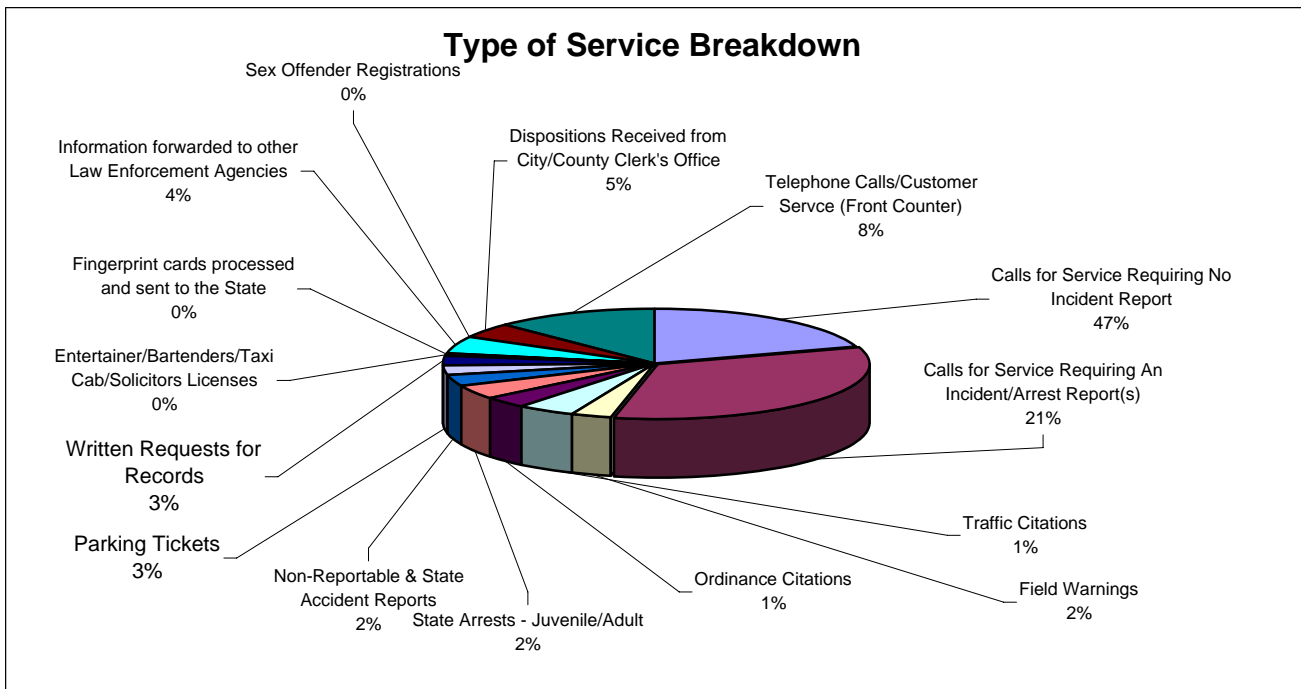

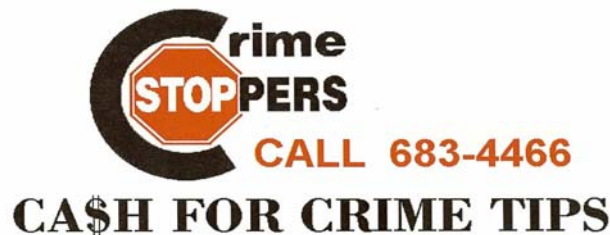




## News Releases for November 2008

On Sunday evening 11-02-08 at approx 10:37 pm, dispatch received a 911 call from a pay phone outside a south side convenience store. The male subject advised dispatch that we would find his body in the river tomorrow and hung up. MTPD and MTSO officers checked the surrounding area without locating the subject. Officer Matt Wallander continued checking the area and located a male subject on the 10<sup>th</sup> St. Bridge. Officer Wallander observed the subject take off his jacket and sweatshirt and lay them onto the sidewalk. Officer Wallander called out for assistance and cautiously approached the subject. The male subject had now climbed over the 5 foot railing and now stood facing the river on the outside of the railing. Officer Wallander struck up a conversation with the subject while Officer Paul Behrendt arrived. Other responding officers were staging in the vicinity. As Officer Wallander continued talking with the subject, both Officer Wallander and Behrendt continued moving in until they were close enough to grab onto the subject by his belt and upper torso. Officer Scott Keil and Jason Denk quickly moved in to assist in bringing the subject back over the rail to safety. Officer's claimed the male subject who was very distraught over a family member that had died some time ago and alcohol also played a factor. The male subject told officers, "If you guys wouldn't have showed up, I would have jumped." The 23-year-old Manitowoc man was transported to a local hospital for evaluation and treatment.

November 29, 2008, The Manitowoc Police Department is again reminding citizens that the winter parking ban for the city of Manitowoc begins December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2008 and runs through March 31, 2009. Parking is restricted or banned on the main thoroughfares or "winter ban" streets from 1:00AM to 6:00AM daily. Parking is still permitted on the side streets pending a snowstorm emergency and a "CITY-WIDE PARKING BAN" as declared by the mayor or his representative. A snow-emergency parking ban would be announced through the local media and also posted on the city's web-site. This declaration is made to assist in the snow plowing efforts throughout the entire city. Violations for parking on the winter ban streets are \$15.00. A violation for parking on the street during a declared snow-emergency if \$40.00.



**Crime Stoppers #1:** The Manitowoc Police Department is offering up to a \$300 cash reward through the Crime Stoppers Program for information regarding a theft of motorcycle parts, which occurred in the city of Manitowoc.

Callers with information leading to the arrest of the person(s) responsible for this theft may become eligible to receive up to \$300.00 cash reward by calling Crime Stoppers at 683-4466. Callers may remain anonymous if they choose.

**Crime Stoppers #2:** The Manitowoc Police Department is offering up to a \$500 cash reward through the Crime Stoppers Program for information concerning a burglary, to TJ's Sports Bar and Grill, 1502 Clark Street, Manitowoc WI.

Callers with information leading to the arrest of the person(s) responsible for this burglary can become eligible to receive up to \$500 cash reward by calling Crime Stoppers at 683-4466. Callers may remain anonymous if they choose.



## **“Highlights on November’s Investigations”**

At approx. 0051 hours, officers responded to the 600 blk. of S.18<sup>th</sup> St. for a fight call. Upon arrival, subjects had already left from the scene in a vehicle and no one answered the upstairs apartment at 620 S. 18<sup>th</sup> St. Officers then cleared from the area. At approx. 0158 hrs., a second call was received that the subjects should have returned and there was a fight going on in the upstairs apartment. Officers responded and located eight (8) males that had been involved in the fight. One of the subjects had sustained a cut or gash to his right arm during the fight with a large amount of blood throughout the apartment. He was transported to an area hospital where he was treated and later released. That subject was one of the four (4) subjects that had returned to the residence. Those subjects were taken into custody on charges of criminal trespassing and battery. One of the parties also had an outstanding warrant. Officers and detectives are continuing the investigation.
